Dinyar Patel is a PhD candidate in the Department of History. His dissertation is on the evolution of the political philosophy of Dadabhai Naoroji (1825-1917), a prominent early Indian nationalist leader and the first Indian elected to the British Parliament (in 1892). In 1906, Naoroji publicly declared *swaraj* or Indian self-government to be the goal of the Indian National Congress. Dinyar's dissertation traces the development of this declaration through Naoroji's early economic work, his engagement with semi-autonomous Indian princely states, and attempts to build alliances for Indian reform with British Liberals and socialists. He has just returned to Harvard after three years of archival research in India and the United Kingdom where he was supported by an IIE Fulbright-Nehru and Fulbright Hays DDRA fellowship.

Dinyar's articles on the Indian history and Indian archival affairs have appeared in the *New York Times* India Ink, *The Hindu*, and *Himal Southasia*. He is the co-editor with Mushirul Hasan of *From Ghalib's Dilli to Lutyens' New Delhi: A Documentary Record* (Oxford University Press, 2013), a collection of edited primary sources from the National Archives of India pertaining to the construction of the city of New Delhi. Along with S.R. Mehrotra, he is coediting *Dadabhai Naoroji: Selected Private Papers* (Oxford University Press, forthcoming 2014).
